The Queen's Songbook (1999): listed "Li'a i ka wai māpuna" as a composition by Lili'uokalani dating from 1850s (see pg 6, bottom and Emerson Smith's chronology of Lili'u's compositions on pg 314 appendix) the melody of which hasn't been found despite efforts.

Conclusion; Transcript of this 1914 recording uses same KBM text, with very few text differences (more than likely, textual variations). This tune is not found in older Hawaiian notation publications anywhere. The tune of this 1914 recording may have a direct connection to Queen Lili'uokalani *or* may be a proximate (or precise) recall of it by July Paka in 1914. *Mahalo* to the Library of Congress Juke Box.

July Paka [Iolai Kealoha Paka; 1874 Honolulu-1943 Santa Monica] He was known to be a favorite of Queen Lili'uokalani. His wife "Toots" was part American Indian and Causasion, taught herself some hula and Hawaiian, and billed herself as an exotic Hawaiian dancer in the troupe. https://books.google.com/books?id=wwTAu75YXw0C&pg=P
